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## Mëkëke (Meadow)

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The *mëkëke* feeds pollinators like amëweyok (bees), memekasàk

(butterflies) and *lelèmpëlisàk* (hummingbirds), which in turn help the wildflowers reproduce.



# Memekas nehënawlachi

**Butterfly milkweed** is one of the only plants on which Monarch butterflies will lay their eggs and the only food source for the baby caterpillars.

Traditionally, Lenape gather the soft woody stalks of memekas nehënawlachi, anakànàskw (rush), and ahpawiak (cattail) in the spring for weaving fishing nets and sitting mats. *Lënii kwshatay* (woodland tobacco) is offered before gathering plants for medicine, food, craft, or ritual.

Monarch Butterflies are often seen in the Gordon Natural Area *mëkëke*. However, because of habitat loss and the effects of climate change, Monarchs are now listed as being globally endangered.
