A program was given at the New Century Club to inform the attendees about the N.R.A., the Community Chest, and the Emergency Relief programs. Dr. Charles C. Rankin, W. O. Lawson, and Ms. Agnes Smart were the speakers.

The non-Partisan Progressive Committee posted an `article' stating why people should not be drinking. Among the reasons stated were the mentality of the drinker's child, and that alcohol prevents the higher evolution of man.

"Camouflaged Bill is Discovered by Girl" in *Daily Local News* (November 2, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

A one dollar bill that was poorly disguised as a counterfeit five dollar bill was discovered at Joseph Giunta's store. The person who supplied the bill is figured to be a resident of West Chester. The bill was accepted as 5 dollar bill and the nature of it was not discovered until said bill was used to make change for another customer. This was not a sophisticated counterfeit bill as all four corners of the face of the bill were covered with cutout "5"'s and on the back of the bill was still emblazoned the money's actual worth, "One."

"Stubborn Coughs Ended by Recipe Mixed at Home" in *Daily Local News* (November 2, 1933), 2. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

A recipe for a cough medicine that can be prepared at home is being shared here. The ingredients are cheap, much cheaper than the cough syrup one would get at the local pharmacy. It is guaranteed to relieve the most stubborn of coughs or "your money back".

"Service Clubs to Help Put Across Community Chest" in *Daily Local News* (November 2, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

The Rotary Club and Lions Club held a meeting at the West Chester YMCA to discuss the dispersing of monies from the West Chester Community Chest to various organizations and services. These services/organizations included: hospitals, state funded schools, relief funds, libraries, Boy Scouts, welfare and other social services, the West Chester Health Council and other activities that made "life worth living."

1933/11/02

"Hospital Women Pledge \$1,000 to Meet Emergency" in *Daily Local News* (November 2, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

At the fall meeting of the Auxiliary to Chester County Hospital the need for funds to continue operating "regularly" was addressed. In response, the Auxiliary added \$1,000 to the amount already being given to the hospital. Thanks were given to nurses and staff for their acceptance of the pay cuts, and not letting it effect their performance.

A new process of heating homes using warm air is being praised. This system uses many ducts installed into your home, so that each room receives heat, instead of it all coming into a solitary room. Not only does your entire house get heated, but you are also able to get more energy from the same amount of coal.

In response, the Auxiliary pledged an additional \$1,000 to the amount already being given to help the continue functioning without any curtailment to its services. Nurses and staff were thanked for taking pay cuts and continuing to work hard.

Women of the Chester County Division of the National Prohibition Reform will travel through four communities of Chester County in their quest to get voters out to voice their opinion in the coming 18 Amendment vote.

"Literary Night at the Baptist Church" in *Daily Local News* (November 4, 1933), 4. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

Literary Night was presented at the Baptist Church of West Chester last night by the Chester County Drama League. A play and three different sets of music were performed during the night.

"Downingtown County Rally For C.E. Members Who Vote" in *Daily Local News* (November 4, 1933). [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

`Christian Endeavor' voters in Chester County voters were addressed last night at the Central Presbyterian Church in Downingtown. The pastor's talk was aimed at getting the members to do their part and vote.

The repealing of Prohibition is being hotly debated between those in favor ("wets") and those against it being repealed ("drys") The issue of Sunday Sports has not had a lot said about it.

No favor was shown towards a yes or no vote, though it was explained that upon repeal of the amendment, \$227,000,000 in taxes would no longer be the voters' responsibility.

"Arrests are Made in Raid by Cops, 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

Three raids were conducted by the West Chester Police, netting many arrests and seizures of alcohol and alcohol related paraphernalia. Some were imprisoned, others fined and released. The most sensational raid was the one made on the Monarch Athletic Club on Saturday, it is the place of 20 yr. old Ralph F. Hoopes.

"Home and School Parley Opens at Teachers College" in *Daily Local News* (November 6, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

The PTA and schools are attempting to cooperate further to meet the needs presented of the student and family. The meeting, held at the State Teachers College, was designed to help the PTA recognize ways that the associations and services of the college can be used to further parent/teacher relations. It will also help the students to know where to look for help from the PTA, whether local or national.

Fox, owner of the building, had recently dropped out of the Delaware Montgomery Counties Master Barber Association and, in doing so, abandoned their policy of price fixing. Then someone threw a brick through the front window of his shop on November 6 [correct date?]. He says that despite the incident he will not up his reduced prices. All barber shops in West Chester are members of the Master Barbers Association, except Fox's, and follow the price fixing policy to the letter.

The first ever meeting held here of the Parent Teachers Association was such a success that the president of the State Teachers college asked that it be held every year.

The passing of the 8th Amendment means that more funds will be going to hospitals and state-aided Educational Institutions. 5 million will be given to hospitals nationwide, while Chester County Hospitals will receive \$48,600. That sum will be split between the 5 hospitals in the area, with Chester County Hospital receiving the most.

"Amendment No. 8 Swept to by Big Majority" in *Daily Local News* (November 8, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

The election, though not all precincts have been counted, favors repealing the 18th Amendment, adoption of the 8th Amendment, and allowing for Sunday sports. [JJ: Was the 8th amendment to the Pennsylvania Constitution?]

The 18th Amendment looks doomed for repeal while the 8th Amendment was supported by a large majority, Sunday sports also looked to be favored. The fact of Chester County voting "wet" goes against their traditional voting trends.

The meeting began with students and counselors conversing in the chapel and was followed with the panel discussion.

The Delaware/Montgomery Counties and Vicinities Master Barbers Association denies any connection with the breaking of non-affiliated barbers' plate glass windows. The Association has stated that members may withdraw without any repercussions.

Two more barber shops were victims of violence as windows were smashed in both. The violence is seen to be stemming from the West Chester barbers' decisions to lower prices in the face of a price fixing policy put forth by the Delaware-Montgomery County's Master Barber Association

"Dr. Steinmatz at Teachers College" in *Daily Local News* (November 10, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

Dr. Steinmatz, a clergyman from Philadelphia, gave a speech to students entitled `The Art of Living.' The talk was organized by the YMCA. The talk's focus was toward a `well-balanced existence,' with proper emphasis on love, worship, reading, humor, honesty, purity in character and work.

"Community Chest Campaign Will Be Launched Tonight" in *Daily Local News* (November 10, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

Captains and team members will be meeting tonight for instructions and to get any last minute details in order to accomplish their goal of collecting \$46,400 for 1934. 150 are expected to be in attendance.

The selling of autos is now being governed by the Principles of Fair Trade Practice. 150 members of the Community Chest Campaign attended the first meeting for the 1934 campaign. The goal of the campaign is to raise enough money to fill West Chester's remaining 1934 budget. An inspiration speech was given by Dr. Samuel Schmucker, citing West Chester as a "wonderful town with wonderful activities for the welfare of its citizens."

"Waives Hearing on Liquor Charge" in *Daily Local News* (November 11, 1933), 1. [Notes by Chris Weering, 2006]

Ralph Hoopes, arrested in the raid on November 6, waived his hearing and posted bail. He is charged with `sale and possession of intoxicating liquor.' A Negro man, William Spriggs, facing the same charge, will be having his hearing today.

The Chester County Re-employment Service has helped 174 men, from the listed 2, 097 applications, get back to work working on Federally funded highways. They are working 30 hour weeks at 40 cents an hour, this means that nearly \$2,000 is going to Chester County men

The State Emergency Relief board has announced that it will supply \$500,000 for shoes and clothing, \$313,500 in food grants, and \$157,750 for fuel to counties in need. Chester County will be receiving an additional \$500 from the state.
